








**Grade 1** working together on group piece inspired by their Socoa trip. Great teamwork! Can you spot the sea cucumber?






This week we were lucky enough to be visited by author <code>Qiu Xiao long</code>. Author of a number of famous fictional crime novels, his most famous series being his inspector series. # Revision Strategy #1 Flash Cards

## What are they?

Flash cards are small, double-sided pieces of card or paper. On one side you write a question or key term. On the other side you write the answer or definition.

Flash cards are an effective tool for revising keywords, vocabulary, and other subject specific information.

#### How to create them?

Buy a pack of blank flash cards; you can also use index cards or postcards or create your own by cutting up card.

- On one side of the card, write a key term or question
- On the other side, write the definition for that key term, or an answer to the question Keep to one idea or concept per flash card, and don't fill the card with a long, complicated answers. Keep them as simple as possible.

#### How to use them?

Because you can only see one side of the card at a time, you can use flash cards to test your knowledge and instantly check if you are correct. Even better, you can ask a parent, brother/sister or a friend to test you using your flash cards:

- Read the question or key term from the front of the card
- Try to recall the definition or answer
- Check your answer by looking at the back of the card

As you work through your flash cards, it is a good idea to separate them into different piles:

- I know this
- Not sure about this
- I don't know this at all

.... and **REPEAT** until you can recall all of the facts from your cards accurately and confidently.
