We then discussed what we could outside of school to keep safe, and there once again, some excellent suggestions: holding hands with an adult and looking both ways, when crossing a road; wearing a helmet when cycling; not eating plants and berries unless an adult has told us that it's safe to do so; "find higher ground"; and the very important "drop and roll". In the end we had to stop because there were just so many excellent ideas and tips.





We then took a break from keeping safe, and Grade 3 shared some tricky riddles that had been writing in their English lessons, before class teachers once again, awarded some certificates of merit for more hard-working children throughout the school.













When the rapturous applause had finally subsided, Mr Hanrahan was able to read out the house points totals, to find out which team had won the trophy this week. There was quiet a distance between 1st and 4th place, with 4th place earning 489 house points, and 1st place earning a whopping 709 house points!

ISB Project



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Book share day in **Grade 2.**










Friday was a non-uniform day:

Grade 6 have been chasing rainbows this week! Using glass prisms we found out how they split white light into all the colours of the rainbow. I wonder if they can explain how they form in our sky.... there are no floating prisms up there!

Grade 9 students have worked in the mathematics class on scale models of the solar system to visualise differences in size and distances between planets. This was a great opportunity to discuss some mind-blowing facts about speed of light, size of the galaxy and of the universe and others astronomical wonders.





Grade 10 did some nice experiments with launching a rocket on a compressed air and water. So, compressed air pushes water out of the rocket at high speed and therefore rocket moves faster and faster. This experiment is also a good example how energies are converted from chemical to kinetic and further on to potential energy (as rocket reaches maximum height).





Grade 10 measuring height of the tree without climbing just with help of trigonometry and ratios - useful general knowledge for future.

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Grades 9-11 final climbing session at Beta Bloc, competing in different challenges for House Points.



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
